Tennis in the News - John McFarlane

Kingstonian John McFarlane was inducted this year into the Kingston & District Sports Hall of Fame as a builder of tennis. In addition to being a successful player (3 Ontario championships, 9 Kingston Tennis Club titles, 5 Jack Campbell Invitational Tennis Tournament championships, 8 club championships at The Landings, and an Ontario Mixed Doubles championship with his wife, Joan), he coached the Queen's Men's and Women's teams, the Canadian National junior team, and the Team Ontario junior team. John has been Technical Director for the Ontario Tennis Association, and was the Chair of Queen's Athletics and Recreation. He retired in 2006 after 29 years of employment at Queen's.

Finger Lakes Cycling Trip by Bud Nelson

June 6-9 saw Bud Nelson, Claire Tremblay, and France Couture, along with former members Larry & Jackie Wark, plus Dave Ballantyne (a co-worker of Bud's) switch their racquets for bikes and head to the Finger Lakes area of New York State. Despite ominous weather reports for that weekend, it turned out to be ideal for biking and hiking (Watkins Glen Gorge), with little actual rain during the daytime and overcast conditions. Daily trips averaged 75km in hilly terrain, with some fast downhill runs: the top speed on Bud's mountain bike was 66km/hr ... almost as fast as his serve! KTC History by Paula Loh

I recently mentioned to one of my elderly neighbours that I was beginning to research the history of the Kingston Tennis Club. She then told me that she had been a KTC president in the 1950s and had coached John McFarlane when he was a junior. Commenting on her own playing ability, Elaine Bryans (nee Fildes) said that she was a "pretty good tennis player in her day". Another neighbour told me afterwards that she had been more than good - she had been national champion! Following up with Elaine, I learned that she was the No.1-ranked female tennis player in Canada in 1947 and the No.2 ranked singles player in both 1949 and 1950, competing in what was then known as the Canadian Championships and is now the Rogers Cup.

Elaine, who also teamed-up with Patricia Macken to become the top-ranked doubles team in the country, qualified for the U.S. national championships three straight years beginning in 1947. She was inducted as an athlete into the McGill Hall of Fame in 2006.

Elaine came to Kingston in 1951 as a Queen's PhysEd instructor and coached the university's tennis teams. She was part of the fight to save KTC from being sold as real estate, since the club had fallen on hard times due to the effects of the war on membership. In the 1940s, men were overseas and women were not free to go play tennis; people were putting their efforts into the Red Cross and other warrelated aspects. A mutually-beneficial arrangement was made to sell the club to Queen's in 1953 (see Spring 2013 newsletter) to enable operations to continue.

Infrastructure

If you were at the club in early Spring, you may have noticed the many shingles that had blown off the **roof** and were lying on Court 1. Water was starting to leak into the clubhouse, necessitating the prompt partial replacement of the roof on the south and east sides of the clubhouse.

Court 1 was also showing signs of deterioration, with areas of paint worn away and creating slippery conditions when transitioning from areas with full traction to those with less traction. A vigorous power-washing by Leo Scully was followed by professional repainting of the play surface. Thanks to Erling Armson for coordinating repairs to the roof and court.

NOTE: **Carpet pieces** are still needed. They are great for mopping up puddles left by our now-frequent rain showers. Heavy-duty carpet pieces with high absorption are sought (see existing pieces hanging at the side of Court 7 for an example). If you have some, please bring them in or arrange for pickup.

Mixed Doubles Tournament, June 14 - 16

This year's tournament was well-attended, with 18 teams of all ages and skill levels participating. Favourable weather on the Friday evening and Saturday of the tournament enabled all preliminary matches to be played, with rain on the Sunday causing the final matches of each flight to be rescheduled. A sunny Tuesday saw the three-set final won in the tie-breaker by Danny Purdon and Lesley Furter in a tight match against Len Guttenberger and Judy Karpinsky. Memorable moments included the deflection of a potentially-damaging volley by the third ball in Len's pocket, and the changeup to Australian formation by Danny and Lesley for a point in the tie-breaker designed to confuse the returner, with Lesley positioned in front of Danny as he served. Thank you to our tournament organizer, steward Jennifer Karmally, for a job well-done.

Coming up next is the Men's and Women's Doubles Tournament on July 12-14. Members of all skill levels are encouraged to participate. If you need a partner, let the stewards know and they will try to find one for you. You are guaranteed three matches. The first round of play can be the most challenging one for intermediate players, as they will often be facing advanced players, but it gets easier after that as similarlyqualified players begin to be matched up for subsequent rounds (ie. winners play winners, losers play losers). The club tournaments provide fun, experience, and the opportunity to meet new people. The entry fee is \$15 per person, which includes a BBQ on the Saturday evening.
